Her longevity underscores the exceptional care provided by LCF, where she has lived since 2011, now enjoying retirement with her 28-year-old partner, Felix. Clarissa has one son, eight grandchildren, 12 great-grandchildren and two great-great-grandchildren. Mongoose lemurs like Clarissa play a vital role in conservation efforts due to their critically endangered status and fragmented wild populations.
